New Year At The Square



The first Hogmanay/New Year celebrations at the Square were held in 2008. Since then there have been celebrations each year, other than during the Covid lockdowns. The basis of these events is simple - gather at the Square about 11.50pm, have a dram or two, get a few tunes from the bagpipes, a blow on a bugle (one on the village symbols), count down to the bells, (the church bell also brings in the New Year,) 2/3 minutes fireworks and finish with a mass rendition of Auld Lang Syne. (As a respect to dog and other pet owners the fireworks timing was restricted to 2/3 minutes).



Then back home/go first footing/finish up in the pub, whatever suits. All very simple but an enjoyable event which has become a tradition.

This year, however, there may be a change to the format. We have been advised by the police that it is illegal to set off fireworks in public spaces. To enable us to do this we will require to apply for a licence from Stirling Council, and this will be done. But the view is that we are unlikely to get this. But, whatever the outcome, **the event WILL go ahead.**Any new information will be put on Facebook.

Remembrance Service: Rev Iain Armstrong, our OLM, and the Kirk Session thank all who attended the Remembrance Day Service, when we remembered those who paid the ultimate sacrifice in service to the nation. This year Rev Iain, four Primary School pupils - Beth Brodie, Esme Fraser, Zoe Hart, Annabelle Webber - Jean O'Connor and Andrew Dallas all participated in the service.

The pupils read out the names of those from the Parish of Gargunnock who fell for their Country in the Great War 1914 – 1918 and in the Second World War 1939 – 1945 and laid a Poppy Wreath at the Village War Memorial, within the church. Following the main Service a short Act of Remembrance took place at the Square when another wreath was laid by the pupils, on behalf of the Residents of the Village, at the Gate into the Fountain Area. Andrew played, the Pipe tune 'Flowers of the Forest'.

We thank all who participated in the Service and for the support of family and friends given to the pupils. A total of £123.20 was collected for the Poppy Scotland Appeal.

At the time of printing, we have yet to announce our grand opening date but are aiming for the end of November, pending final building completion certification from Stirling Council.

The "OLD" Gargunnock Shop

We are, quite rightly, talking about our **NEW** shop and looking forward to the opening. But there has been a shop on that site since it was sold in the 1960s by the local branch of the British Legion who had been using it as a meeting/social hall.

I'm sure the locals have many reminiscences of the "old" shop. It would be good to hear from anyone with photographs or stories of memories from a previous era. Here's one

Prior to 1999 the shop exterior had large window panes and inside there was a straight counter behind which there were 2 steps which led up to an office behind a perspex wall. (The office used to be the stage where the band sat during the British Legion dance nights!!)

In 1999 it was decided to invest in the shop by completely renovating it. The office and counter were removed and the partition wall moved back so as to have more space in the shop rather than have a large storeroom. A new counter was installed, a false ceiling and a new floor. The old plate glass windows were replaced by smaller panes which gave it a lovely village feel. And the name of the shop was changed to Number One Main Street.

After the work was complete a special re-opening ceremony was held to which everyone was invited. The special guest was Viscount George Younger of Leckie (who, along with Lady Younger, were good customers of the shop.) In his opening speech he spoke in glowing terms of the value of a good village shop and then cut the ribbon to formally declare the shop open.

A buffet snack was provided and prosecco was served to everyone, including the large number of locals waiting to get in to the shop. A great afternoon/ evening was had by all!!

So, if you have photographs or stories of your shop memories, (there were Santa events, seasonal displays etc) please let me have them and I could collate them in to a collection which could be donated to the village.

Greenwich Meantime versus Gargunnock Time at Hogmanay.

The church bells in Gargunnock have rung for hundreds of years. When I was a boy we were told that the timing of the church bell, rung then at 10:30am for Sunday School and 12:30 pm for Church Service, was a reflection of ancient pre-Reformation times when the monks of Cambuskenneth held sway here.

Nowadays the bell is only rung once on a Sunday, precisely 10 minutes before the start of the service (that's if I'm there. If I'm not no one else can do it) I say precisely because I have one of those smarty-pants watches which keeps very accurate time thanks to the vibrations of a wee caesium atom somewhere deep in the heart of Europe and because I have a thing about precision.

On Hogmanay I ring out the old year for 1 minute precisely 3 minutes before midnight then a short time later welcome in the New Year bang on the GMT stroke of midnight.

Meanwhile, down at the Square a large crowd of happy folks are attempting to do the same thing only not quite as accurately (IMHO!)



But therin lies a wee long-standing difference of opinion between myself and Maitland Clark (above) Leader of the Pack of aforementioned merrymakers.

For the benefit of those of you who may be new to the area Maitland is a very well known and loved personality here. Exkindly (his words) village Shop-Keeper/Postmaster, compere at many a village concert, gala, flower show and numerous other events he's an all-round good-guy who can be found annually at the heart of the New Year festivities in the Square, usually festooned with many flashing lights plus a large clock hanging round his neck from which, he maintains, the real GMT is measured, or rather, he asserts, GmT, Gargunnock micro Time!

Try as I might over the years I have been unable able to persuade him that my time is the correct one and the noisy count-downs, fireworks, drum and bugle are never quite as accurate ... pretty close, but innacurate. My arguments however have invariably fallen on deaf ears.

But hey, does it really matter? "Takes all kinds," as they say so till next year I'll continue on my pedantic way while Maitland and his

merry band do their own thing and why not. It's a village thing.

Meantime may I wish you all a very Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year

PS. A wee thought has just occurred to me. Since the centre of the Square is actually 4 degrees 4 minutes and 58 seconds west of the Greenwich meridian then strictly speaking midnight won't actually arrive here till approximately 16 minutes 19.62 seconds after GMT.



Winter Snow and Ice Clearing and Gritting Routes

The Community Council and the Gargunnock Trust have been informed that as part of making significant cost savings, Stirling Council are proposing to reduce the winter maintenance and gritting services across the Council area. Two aspects of this affect Gargunnock in particular.

Firstly, Stirling Council has set out their plan to engage **Community Winter Volunteers**, to clear footways and footpaths in their local area. Their proposal is shown below:

'Stirling Council Road Services would like to empower local communities to play an active role within their community during the winter period by offering a Community Winter Volunteer scheme. This will involve members of local communities, in their spare time, clearing snow from footways and footpaths not included in Stirling Council's Winter Service Plan. Those who apply to become a Community Winter Volunteer will be provided with safety clothing, the correct equipment and training to carry out the tasks and support them in their role.

As a Council, we have to prioritise where we concentrate our efforts during winter, and it would be impossible for us to grit every footpath and footway when snow or ice occurs. In winter we focus on gritting priority routes which pose the greatest risk to safety if not treated. By becoming a Community Winter Volunteer, this allows smaller communities to get the help they desire in winter. The areas that Community Winter Volunteers may clear include council adopted footways and footpaths. Volunteers must not clear footways and footpaths included within the Council's Winter Service Plan. Maps will be provided of areas that Volunteers may clear. This information pack includes all the relevant information for community volunteers to undertake their role as a Community Winter Volunteer and assist their community over the winter period'.

This proposal was discussed by both the Gargunnock Community Council and the Trust at their separate meetings. Both organisations agreed that this was not an area they would formally like to engage with. It was felt that there would be too much of a demand placed on volunteers to deliver a service which has traditionally been the responsibility of the Council. Whilst appreciating the exceptional financial pressures faced by the Council, it was agreed that the responsibility and risk imposed on volunteers would be too great.

It was also noted that within Gargunnock, volunteers have regularly offered exceptional support across the community when we have faced adversity, weather related or otherwise. The reduction and absence of routine maintenance around the village by Stirling Council has also been an area of discussion at meetings in recent years.


The second aspect affecting Gargunnock this winter, is the planned changes to the gritting of Manse Brae and Main Street. These two roads used to be priority 1 routes, meaning any forecast of snow or ice would lead to them being gritted. Both roads appear to have been downgraded to priority 2.

The only P1 routes for Gargunnock are now the bus route - Station Road and Leckie Road. Our understanding is that P2 routes will only be treated if ice or snow conditions are forecast to continue unbroken beyond 24 hours. Even then, the roads will only be gritted when treating them will not prove detrimental to treating P1 routes.

We are therefore unlikely to see gritters along Manse Brae and Main Street.

Gargunnock Community Council is very concerned about this proposed change. The two hills in the village, especially Main Street, present a considerable hazard when there is snow or ice. Both roads lead to the main areas of habitation within the village and because of the way they are accessed from the Village Square, it is necessary to stop at the foot of both hills. The consequent loss of traction makes it very difficult to make progress up the hills in snow. Likewise, coming down the hills is hazardous, especially on Main Street, where the road is, in effect, a single lane. Emergency vehicles will have similar difficulties if these roads are not gritted. Other local villages do not have the same geography as Gargunnock, which we believe is further justification for the continuation of the gritting of these two roads.

The Community Council has written to Stirling Council to request that these roads continue to be gritted, especially as any net savings to the Council appear to be minimal for two short, but essential sections of road.
