CARETAKER WANTED

Gargunnock Community Trust is looking for a Caretaker for the Community Centre

The Caretaker will be part of the team – which includes an administrator, cleaner, boiler engineer and volunteer Trust Directors – who look after the Community Centre, and will help ensure the smooth running of the Centre by monitoring the building and supporting users.

KEY DUTIES

- Coordinate with the Administrator for details of bookings, user requirements, etc.;
- Assist with the set-up of the stage, rooms, and sound system, as required;
- · Coordinate with the Cleaner to ensure the premises are cleaned to a high standard;
- Maintain stocks of tea/coffee, and janitorial supplies (keeping accurate records for payment);
- Perform a weekly inspection of emergency equipment; and
- Perform minor maintenance and repairs, where safe and within Caretaker's ability.

The average amount of time involved will be 10 hours per month with an honorarium of £1,200 per year. The post would suit someone who is available in the village during the day.

Update on our position regarding the Vacancy:

Since the retiral of Rev. Andy, 17 months ago, the Vacancy of our linked charge has been sisted, which means we cannot Call a Minister. Stirling Presbytery have been investigating the possibilities of a Hub Ministry with 4,5 or 10 congregations on the Card being led by 1 or 2 Ministers of Word and Sacrament and full time or part time support staff in administration and mission work. The investigation is still ongoing but our Interim Moderator, Val Rose, is on our case. Unfortunately due to family circumstances Rev Lynne Mack has retired from her position of Ordained Local Minister with Stirling Presbytery at the end of September and therefore her appointment with us.

Rev Lynne has been with us from November 2014 and has been our mainstay over these last 17 months, doing far more than the remit for an OLM states. Such is her commitment to our congregation to maintain a presence of the Church within the Community, that she has not only been conducting Sunday Worship but caring of folks in their time of need. She has officiated in the good times of family life – Weddings and Baptisms but also in the sad times of death of a loved one.

She will be missed for her conscientious delivery of the Teachings of Christ, her administration, enthusiasm and her positive attitude to life which encourages those around her. Above all for her commitment to her calling, which has been evident throughout her five years with us but also in retirement she is willing to provide cover for Communion, Baptisms, Wedding and Funeral Services, during the time our vacancy is sisted. On behalf of the Church Family and those in the community for whom she has provided care in the times of need, the Kirk Session wish her a peaceful, healthy and long retirement with God's blessings to her and her family.

Remembrance Service: Val Rose, our Interim Moderator, and the Kirk Session thank Mrs Jean Porter, Moderator of the Stirling Presbytery, the Representatives of the Community Council, the Guides and Brownies for their participation in the Remembrance Day Service, when we remembered those who have paid the ultimate sacrifice in service to the nation. During the service Lovat MacGregor laid a Poppy wreath at the Village War Memorial, within the church, on behalf of the Residents of the village.

After the Service a short Act of Remembrance took place at the Square when a wreath was laid at the Flagpole by Douglas Barr. Both gentlemen represented the Community Council.

Book Reviews



Little Fires Everywhere by Celeste Ng

I was looking for a book for our Book Club, when I came across this recommendation from Jodi Picoult, an author I admire very much. "I read Little Fires Everywhere in a single, breathless sitting. With brilliance and beauty, Celeste Ng dissects a microcosm of American society just when we need to see it beneath the microscope: how do questions of race stack up against the comfort of privilege, and what role does that play in parenting? Is motherhood a bond forged by blood, or by love? And perhaps most importantly: do the faults of our past determine what we deserve in the future? Be ready to be wowed by Ng's writing – and unsettled by the mirror held up to one's own beliefs."

It's quite a recommendation and might leave you to wonder if you might be a little disappointed by what's behind the cover. Well, in my case, I found the story and the characters thought provoking, and has left me thinking about them a lot – what motivated their actions, and in some cases where they might be now – post the end of the book.

Little Fires Everywhere is the story of the Richardson family who to the outside world look perfect, but who under the surface are just like everyone else - facing trials and tribulations that test their relationships with each other, their friends and their acquaintances. Their picture-perfect world is slowly exposed for what it really is following the arrival of an artistic and mysterious mother, Mia Warren, and her teenage daughter Pearl, after they rent a small home from the Richardsons. Gradually everyone is drawn to Mia and Pearl and their lives become intertwined.

When a friend of Mrs Richardson tries to adopt a Chinese-American baby, Mia is supportive of the baby's birth mother, and Mrs Richardson's obsession with Mia and her motives brings destructive consequences.

Celeste Ng manages to bring multiple characters, with many stories into the book in a fast and engaging way. I found myself with each character being able to relate them to people I know or have known throughout my life. I liked some more than others, and I found myself examining my role as a mother and thinking about my future relationship with my children as they grow and fly the nest.

For me Little Fires Everywhere was totally absorbing. And I found myself changing sides throughout the book, in exactly the same way the characters themselves do. Beautifully written and highly engaging.

The Scottish Learning Festival

In early September 2019, the Scottish Learning Festival was held in the SECC in Glasgow, for people to advertise learning products and schools and teachers to share

ideas. Gargunnock Primary got an invite to attend, so Mrs Rushton, P6 pupil Katie, and P7 pupil Ruby took a train to Glasgow with a display about Pupil Leadership to share. Gargunnock was set up in the Stirling Council section, along with mental health Ambassadors from Wallace High School.

showed them the charts we had used, to gather information on pupil's opinions, and showed them how we were improving the ones we need to work on. Then we went on to tell everybody about the 4 skills Academies, Books, Sports, Digital and Eco, and what different jobs each group has around School. At one station, 'Live 'n' Learn UK', there was a lucky spin of a wheel, and Mrs Rushton won a huge collection of all 40 growth mind set posters to take home for our School! 


Athletics

Phishing

There are still reports of these types of attacks to defraud money from people. Criminals and Organised Crime Groups launch Phishing attacks, targeting personal/business accounts either by email, social media, or text. They encourage users to click on malicious link/attachments which compromise their email or social media accounts, asking users to divulgebanking information or access sensitive information.

The advice below describes how you can spot suspicious emails, and the steps you can take to ensure that you don't fall victim, both at work and home:

- •Confirm details of the actual email address it came from, you can do this by hovering mouse over the senders email address.
- •Many phishing emails have poor grammar, punctuation and spelling.
- •Is the design and overall quality what would you'd expect from the organisation the email is supposed to come from?
- •Is it addressed to you by name, or does it refer to 'valued customer', or 'friend', or 'colleague'? This can be a sign that the sender does not actually know you, and that it is part of a phishing scam.
- •Does the email contain a veiled threat that asks you to act urgently, or cause intrigue? Be suspicious of words like 'send these details within 24 hours' or 'you have been a victim of crime, click here immediately'.
- •Look at the sender's name. Does it sound legitimate, or is it trying to mimic someone you know?
- •If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is. It's most unlikely that someone will want to give you money, or give you access to a secret part of the Internet.
