Local Place Plan

We're now moving towards the final version of the Local Place Plan, incorporating feedback from the draft we distributed with the last issue of the Bugle. (It's also online via the GCC page on the Gargunnock website.)

To recap, the LPP is required by Stirling Council as part of the national planning framework from Scottish Govt. So, it's a proposal by a community body about the development and use of land, and captures where we, the community, see the next 10 years. The aim is to improve people's engagement and involvement in the planning system. The LPP is a way for communities to achieve change in their local area by proactively feeding into the overall development planning process.

Gargunnock Community Council wants to ensure the voice of the community is at the centre of the LPP and this there have is why been – and will continue to be – extensive consultation with residents as we move towards a final version. We'll be arranging another consultation and review meeting soon to share where we are at this point and gather further views.

It's important to recognise that the final document is not a statement of what will happen. It is an opportunity for us to highlight what we see as our collective priorities to improve the area we live in. And spotlight the areas we want to organically and sympathetically preserve and protect, while ensuring the continued sustainability of our community overall.



Project updates

A811

GCC has been campaigning for improvements to the road junction from Station Road onto the A811 for many years. The recent accidents on the A811 near Gargunnock have reinforced the need for action. An agreement was reached with Stirling Council that improvement works to the visibility splays at the Station Road / A811 would be planned in 2024 and that work would be carried out in 2025- 26.

A topographical survey was undertaken in October 2024, and this was used to inform the preliminary design for a visibility improvement at the junction. Contact has been made with the agent acting on behalf of the landowner. Once the proposals have been agreed with the landowner the detailed design of the proposals will be developed. It is expected that the junction will be constructed in 2025/26.



Fountain Clean Up

We've reached agreement with the relevant people in Stirling Council as to what can be done, we have a specialist contractor to do the work, and we have the funding to do it. (Thanks, WFP and GCT). We're now just waiting for the licence from Stirling Council to allow this work to progress, and hopefully this will be forthcoming before too much longer.

Website Development

We're now at the point where we can build on the excellent foundations of the original website, and we're about to appoint the web developer to move this forward. A joint project team from GCT and GCC have been looking at layout and functionality. We expect to have some outline layouts shortly, and then we'll be able to start gathering content. (Again, thanks to WFP and GCT for supporting this important project.)

Members

We said goodbye to our Vice-chair, Carolyn Johnston, who had to move closer to Glasgow for family reasons; and David Millar is stepping back from Chairing Council for the moment but will remain with us. We thank them both for all their efforts. An Interim Chair has been identified and will be appointed at the next GCC meeting at the end of March. We are also keen to co-opt some additional members so if you'd like to join the team that is working to support our community with projects like these, do get in touch with any Council member for an informal chat, or contact us via gargunnockcommunitycouncil@gmail.com

Village Walking Map

Anyone who knows me knows that I enjoy drawing maps. Usually, reproductions of ancient historical maps but modern maps too, hence the village map on the notice board. About 20 years ago a walking map of the area was produced in fold-up concertina form but that's long out of print (and maybe a bit old-fashioned now) so in response to one or two hints a while back I decided to have a go at a replacement and here it is.

Of course, nowadays everything has to be available on a smartphone or tablet so if you scan the QR code on the map you should get, nicely proportioned for your phone, 2 maps: the one here in the magazine (see centre spread overleaf) plus a simple street map of the village. Following on from that as you scroll down, you'll find a short history of the village followed by detailed descriptions of no less than local 7 walks. You can zoom into the maps without any loss of quality.





We have enjoyed themed afternoons and encourage a variety of crafting, reading and sports outside.

Old Leckie Farm

January and February can often be the least cheery of all the months on the farm. With the cold weather and stagnant growth it can feel like the colour has leached from everything. Out and about everything has a brownish tinge to it, not helped by the flat light from low arc of the sun. Then, thankfully, the snowdrops finally push up their white bells, followed closely by the bright yellow flowers of the low lying aconites. Returning from a half term break the crocus brings the first purples and as I write this I can see the first orange trumpet of a daffodil celebrating the move into more colourful times.

Winter has brought with it the usual high and lows of farming. Like everyone else there has been no escape for farmers from the inflationary cost pressures of the last couple of years. It has felt like a long wait for the live market sale price to catch up but the last few months have finally brought a welcome uplift in both lamb and beef sales. Here on the Carse farms are nervously waiting to see the impact of the Schmallenberg virus on the 2025 new born lambs. Of no risk to humans this midge borne virus effects fertility in sheep and can lead to malformations of the lambs as they develop. There has been wide exposure amongst our own sheep so we wait nervously for the April lambing season to begin. Schmallenberg aside it's really important that pregnant sheep aren't subject to stress so - as ever - please make

every effort to keep dogs on a lead and under control if walking through the farm.

Before we get there we will have a busy March with the retirement of our current Leckie Layers and the placing of new hens. As long as we get no formal avian flu lock down we will work again with the British Hen Welfare Trust to rehome our ladies before we crack on with the deep clean of the hen houses before our new younger birds arrive. Along with our next batch of pigs almost grown, and a regular through put of our grass finished native beef we'll then be well placed to keep growing great local food through the year – thoughtfully produced by us, for you. If you don't already enjoy our produce you can buy our eggs in the village shop, or order eggs and meat for home delivery via our online shop at www.oldleckie.co.uk – we deliver to the village every Friday. Thanks for the ongoing support and custom – roll on the Spring!

Latest grants awarded: since our last update, we are delighted to share that there have been another eight successful grants awarded by the Windfarm Panel,

- £420 for foraging workshops that will be happening this spring and summer
- £936 to print local place plan you received with last Bugle
- £93.49 to plant some additional trees at Glebe Park
- £113 to replant along Beeches Path
- £250 supporting a young person in the village to take part in a rugby tour
- £4,250 providing each house a £10 voucher for local shop in this edition of Bugle
- £300 for safe parking signs at the school
- £4,794 has been allocated to improving the village website

The panel was pleased to support these applications and would like to encourage continued applications from across the community.

Our new updated forms and Fund Guidelines are up and running on the village website, https://www.gargunnock.org/wind-farm-applications

As a reminder we made the following changes in January-

- Individuals are now able to apply for grants up to £500 (previous level was £300).
- Quotes are now not required for individual and group grants up to £500 (previously £300).
 - 1 Quote should be included with grant applications between £500 and £999.
 - o 3 Quotes need to be included for grant applications £1,000 and over.

The next deadline date for applications is not until 11th August but if you have something you would like to apply for between now and then please do drop us an email at windfarmpanel@gargunnock.org



Gargunnock Walking Group - February 2025

The Gargunnock Walking Group has continued to meet at regular intervals enjoying new walks and repeating old favourites. Our most recent walk was the Bochastle Hill circuit north of Kilmahog. As often happens the weather was better than predicted and we had fine views of the surrounding hills and lochs. The walk was followed by an excellent lunch at the Lade Inn.

The last report for the Bugle also referred to a walk at Beecraigs Country Park. This was also an excellent walk with nice forest paths and fine views from the top of Cockleroy. The walk was followed by lunch in one of the excellent pubs in Linlithgow.



At the time of writing the next walk will be on 27th February, and we will go to Forest Lodge at Aberfoyle and do a circuit through the forest there. The dates for walks in March will be Tuesday 11th March and Thursday 27th March.

As usual these walks will depend up on the weather on the day. We want to maintain the tradition of walking on fine clear days when we expect to have stunning views of the surrounding countryside. And we are always on the look-out for new and interesting walks within easy access of Gargunnock

Please note that one of the few rules that we have is no dogs. The primary reason for this is that we occasionally walk though areas where livestock graze and I would not wish to be associated with anyone's dog however well-disciplined whilst in the vicinity of cattle. The Village Flagpole

Anyhow, the graffiti was removed and we all got on with our lives again. But, despite my pleading, we've not had a St George's flag since. The argument being that they didn't want to provoke a repeat of what had happened.

After a bit more discussion, we agreed that if I bought the flag, it would be flown again on St George's Day.

So, I've bought it and look forward to seeing it flying at the end of April. And I sincerely hope that it will fly unmolested as a symbol of what I believe Gargunnock to be - an open, welcoming community to people of every race, nationality, and background. Our diversity is something we should celebrate and acknowledge that we're stronger for it.


